Course Description

This class is designed to provide an overview of the structure, process, and function of the American criminal justice system. Students will explore the police, courts, and corrections that make up the criminal justice system and its structure, function, and interrelationship between the components. The course also covers how race, class, and gender operate in criminal justice and encourages students to think about controversial issues of criminal justice in America.

Evaluation

1.Participation (20%): Quizzes

Students will solve one set of quizzes for a week. There would be approximately 12 quizzes during the semester. You are free to refer to the textbook and your notes when you solve these questions. These quizzes are based on the lecture for each week and will be uploaded on **Friday at 12:40pm**. You can access them through the Canvas Quizzes feature and should submit your answer by **Saturday 11:59 pm**. Late submission will not be accepted, and you will receive zero credit. At the end of the semester, only the 10 sets of quizzes are used for the calculation of the final quiz score. Each of the 10 scores will be equally weighted.

2.Short Essay (20%): 2 Essays

You will write two essays over the semester. The goal of this essay is to develop your idea *succinctly and clearly* on issues in the criminal justice system in the United States. You can write your essay by using class materials (e.g., Journals, films, lectures, textbooks) and doing external research. The essay must be a maximum of **1 PAGE (This limit does not include references)** and only **PDF format** is accepted. Your essay will be graded not only on timely submission (Late submission will not be allowed) but also on your original and critical analysis of an essay question. You can discuss your essay with the instructor and get help from UF Writing Studio (<https://writing.ufl.edu/writing-studio/>). Plagiarism will be detected in both essays.

- First Short Essay (Due by Feb. 24, 11:59 PM)
- Second Short Essay (Due by April. 19, 11:59 PM)

3. Exam (60%): Exam 1 and Exam 2

There will be two exams in this course. Each exam includes questions from the required textbook and lectures. Each exam will account for 30% of your final grade. **Exams will take place in the classroom.** (*Honorlock online proctoring is not provided for our class.*) You need to bring your fully charged laptop to take the exam via the Canvas quiz. There will be NO cumulative exams, which means each exam deals with one module. (*Module 1: exam1, Module 2: exam2*). Only the exam should be on in your screen, and you **MUST** close all other tabs (Any other tabs or windows will be considered cheating). The use of any mediums that the instructor did not permit will also be considered cheating.

Make-up exams will be allowed only in those circumstances in which you cannot take an exam for a valid reason according to UF policy. In that case, you should notify me before the start of the examination. In addition, you will need to provide valid documentation (within a week) justifying your absence.
