**Fall 2022 to present**

Created the first overseas program for Sociology and Criminology and Law undergraduate majors and minors. This process has involved multiple stages of proposing, planning and implementing the program, including significant time investment both pre and post-departure.

Tasks have included: developing a detailed proposal following the criteria of UF's International Studies program; attending the International Studies Fair each fall and spring semesters to publicize the program; preparing and marketing additional recruitment material; reviewing student applications and conducting face-to-face interviews with applicants; evaluating scholarship applications; holding pre-planning and pre-departure meetings with students;

meeting with UFIC personnel to monitor and manage enrollments; meeting with personnel at partner university in France and our provider liaison (Learn International) to plan curriculum; plan course content to maximize international experience through immersive activities, course requirements, and experiential excursions; teach the course over a 4-week semester; supervise students and provide support for mental, emotional and physical needs as they arise while overseas; prepare debriefing report for UFIC upon return; continue to interact and communicate with students to encourage reflection of their experiences; assist students with developing strategic inclusion of their learning experience into their professional portfolios.

Coordinate one of the largest undergraduate majors at UF with enrollments fluctuating between 450-800 majors/minors over my tenure.
