There are no required textbooks for this course. All readings will be available via UF Libraries or posted on Canvas.

Course Description

This survey course promotes an understanding of law and the U.S. legal system. It serves as an introduction to legal ethics, civil procedure, criminal law and procedure, family law, contract law, torts, and property law. Readings and cases are used to analyze (1) how disputes are resolved by application of legal principles to factual situations, (2) the implications of legal decisions on future cases, (3) and how justice is served by law.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course students should be able to:

- Read, analyze and critically engage with legal opinions.
- Discuss the role of morality and ethics in law
- Describe the various sources of law and theories for judicial decision making
- Discuss the various forms of jurisdictions.
- Discuss the function and role of the civil trial system in our society
- Discuss the criminal procedural law as it relates to seizures, arrests, and interrogations by police, and one's constitutional rights.
- Discuss the role of the state in defining and establishing requirements for marriage and divorce.
- Discuss the requirements for contract formation and the obligations created, as well as the role of contracts in society.
- Discuss the role of tort law in society.
- Describe the balance of interests between property rights, environmental concerns, and the government.

Course Grading

Exams – 20%. There are 2 exams, and each exam will be worth 10% of your grade.

Quizzes – 20%. There are 8 quizzes, and each quiz will be worth 2.5% of your grade.


Papers – 20%. There are 3 papers, and each paper will be worth 6.67% of your grade.

Attendance/ Participation - 25%. Attendance will be taken at random throughout the semester.

Activities - 15% - There will be 4 in-class group activities throughout the semester, worth 3.75% each.

Email

Attendance is required and part of your grade is participation in class. Participation will be determined with in-class writing assignments or activities. <u>You cannot make up participation assignments.</u>

In this class you will be required to read specific legal cases and other readings related to the class material. Sometimes you will be asked to listen to Podcasts. The participation assignments will require you to have read or listened to this material already, therefore it is your responsibility to come to class prepared to discuss these cases, readings and/or Podcasts.

You should attend the entire class period. If you attend the first half of class and we do an attendance assignment in the second half of class, you will be marked absent, and this will not be excused. In other words, if you do not stay in class the full time, you will not earn attendance points.

You are responsible for getting any notes and/or assignments from your fellow classmates should you need to miss class. As students, you must take responsibility for learning the material covered in class.

Quizzes

All quizzes will be on Canvas. You will receive <u>two 12-minute attempts</u> to take each quiz. They will consist of 10 true/false and multiple choice questions The questions will be different each time. This provides you the opportunity to improve your grade by giving you time to go back and study the material. <u>You will not be given the correct answers.</u> So, know what material and questions you felt less familiar with and focus on that to study before your second attempt. If you have specific questions about what you got wrong or about material you did not understand, please email the instructor. Quiz dates are on Canvas and course schedule.

Exams

All exams will be on Canvas. You will only get one attempt to take the exam. The exams consist of true/false and multiple choice questions. You will need to download and install Respondus Lockdown Browser. A link to that software is available on Canvas (go to the home page and click on the "Welcome" icon). Again, after you submit your exam, <u>you will not be given</u> <u>the correct answers</u>. If you have specific questions about what you got wrong or about material you did not understand on the exam, please email the instructor. Exam dates are on Canvas and course schedule.

Papers

<u>Three</u> papers are due in this course. There are three movies that you will be responsible for watching over the course of the semester, and you must write a paper on all three movies. <u>Movies will either be available for free or will be no more than \$4 to rent</u>. Papers must be submitted on Canvas, or they will not be accepted. The rubric and exact due dates are available on Canvas and the course schedule. You will be graded based on your:

1. Summary of the movie (20%) – limit this part to 1.5 pages max;

2. Incorporation of relevant case law and assigned readings to explain the significance of the topics discussed in the movie and how it applies to the course material (30%) – this part should:

- Be at least one full page (10%),
- Incorporate and cite relevant case law from the readings or the lectures (at least two cases) (20%)

3. Opinion of the movie and whether it changed your perspective on the topic (10%);

4. Use of correct formatting requirements (40%) -

• 3 full pages, 12 pt. Times New Roman font, double-spaced, 1" margins, reference page

Important Note: It is the responsibility of the student to make sure they turn in a working file. Extensions will not be provided if the student turns in a corrupt file. Students may email the instructor at least 24 hours before the due date should they have any concerns about their file.

Activities

There will be 4 in-class group activities throughout the semester. These activities will require you to apply course material and/or relevant case law. The purpose of these activities is to help you better understand the course material. For these activities, you will be graded on whether you complete all parts of the activity and on the accuracy of your responses. Dates for the class activities can be found on the course schedule.

Course Policies

Classroom Rules of Conduct

- Please keep in mind that grades for this semester are due August 8th, so if you have any questions about any of the final assignments (e.g., exam 2), you will need to reach out to me no later than August 6th.

<u>Make-up Work</u>

- All make-up work is the student's responsibility. If you know you may

 sometimes one's personal life interferes with the ability to take a quiz,
 turn in a paper, attend class, etc. If you have a legitimate reason for

 missed without a grade deduction If you contact me immediately
 before/after the missed assignment. Religious holidays are excused
 without documentation but must be discussed with the instructor in
 advance.

For each day the paper is late, your grade will be <u>reduced by 10%</u> (i.e., if your paper is 2 days late, you will receive a 20% deduction). <u>Any work submitted after 48 hours will not be</u> <u>accepted.</u>
