CJL 2000 Law and the Legal Process

Course Description

This course promotes an understanding of law and the U.S. legal system. It serves as an introduction to legal ethics, civil procedure, criminal law and procedure, family law, contract law, torts, and property law. Readings and cases are used to analyze (1) how disputes are resolved by application of legal principles to factual situations, (2) the implications of legal decisions on future cases, (3) and how justice is served by law.

Quizzes	There are 8 non-cumulative, closed note quizzes. There is one quiz for each module except for Modules 5 and 10 which do not have quizzes. You will need to download and install Respondus Lockdown Browser. A link to that software is available on Canvas (go to the home page and click on the "Start Here" button). The quizzes consist of 10 multiple choice and true/false questions. You will have 10 minutes to complete each quiz. You will receive two attempts to take each quiz. The questions will be different each time. This provides you the opportunity to improve your grade by giving you time to go back and study the material. You will not be given the correct answers. So, know what material and questions you felt less familiar with and focus on that to study before your second attempt. If you have specific questions about what you got wrong or about material you did not understand, you can email the instructor. Quizzes are due on Sundays by 11:59pm EST. Once you have completed the readings and discussion and viewed the lectures for that week, make sure you study this material thoroughly. After you've studied the material, you should be ready to take the quiz. The quiz is timed, so it is necessary for you to know all the material prior to starting the quiz as if it were a closed book quiz (i.e., there will not be enough time to look up each answer in your notes, so you should prepare as if your notes were not available to you). Exams	There are two non-cumulative, closed note exams. You will only get one attempt to take each exam, and you will need to use Respondus Lockdown Browser. The exams consist of multiple choice and true/false questions. You will have 60 minutes to complete each exam. After you submit your exam you will not be given the correct answers. If you have specific questions about what you got wrong or about material you did not understand on the exam, you can email the instructor.	20%

Papers	There are three papers due in this course. There are five movies that we will watch over the course of the semester, and you may choose to write a paper on any three. Make-up Work

All make-up work is the student's responsibility. If you know you may miss a class, inform the instructor as soon as possible. I understand that sometimes one's personal life interferes with the ability to take a quiz, turn in a paper, attend class, etc. If you have a legitimate reason for missing a class or assignment (e.g., documented illness), and **can provide documentation**, you will be allowed to make up what you missed without a grade deduction IF you contact me immediately before/after the missed assignment. Late assignments will be accepted within 48 hours of the due date and will have the grade lowered as a penalty. For each day the paper is late, your grade will be reduced by 10%. Any work submitted after 48 hours will not be accepted unless you have a documentable reason for the late submission.

Any requests for make-ups due to technical issues MUST be accompanied by the ticket number received from the Help Desk when the problem was reported to them. The ticket number will document the time and date of the problem. You MUST e-mail your instructor within 24 hours of the technical difficulty if you wish to request a make-up.
