**COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE:** This course examines the effects of group characteristics, social behavior and social organization on the causation, amelioration, and prevention of mental and physical illness. The purpose of this course is to introduce you to a sociological perspective of the study of health and illness. A major goal of this course is to provide the conceptual tools needed to understand the social and cultural dimensions of health and disease, in addition to the biological factors. Among the questions we will explore are: How is the risk of illness, injury, and other health problems related to social characteristics and contexts? What issues will shape the future of population?

**COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:** The goal of the course is to understand how health and illness are connected to social behavior and the organization of society. By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Articulate the complementary nature of sociological and biomedical approaches to health.
- Describe the ways that population health is measured.
- Explain historical changes in population health.
- Describe the effects of inequality on health.
- Describe the organization of the U.S. healthcare system.

## COURSE POLICIES:

**QUIZZES:** You are required to complete 12 short quizzes during the semester that will account for 30 percent of your final grade (each quiz is worth a maximum of 30 points). Quizzes will consist of 15 multiple choice questions and must be completed within a 30-minute interval on the due date (all due dates are listed on the Canvas syllabus page). Quizzes taken after the due date will not count toward your final grade. This portion of your grade will be based on your 10 highest quiz scores (you may drop the lowest quiz scores).

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS: You are required to submit 12 writing assignments during the semester that will account for 50 percent of your final grade (each writing assignment is worth a maximum of 50 points). Writing assignments are brief essays or discussions designed to gauge your understanding of the course material. Writing assignments must be completed and submitted via Canvas on or before the due date (all due dates are listed on the Canvas syllabus page). Late assignments or assignments not submitted via Canvas will not be accepted. This portion of your grade will be based on your 10 highest writing assignment scores (you may drop the lowest writing assignment scores).

**ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY PROJECT:** You are required to submit an annotated bibliography project that will account for 20 percent of your final grade (200 points). For this project, you will first select one of the social determinants of health that we will learn about in this course. Then, you will (1) find five articles published in peer-reviewed journals in the last twenty years (since 2003) that focus on the social determinant that

you selected. The project will consist of a citation and a critical summary of each article, and a conclusion in which you will describe the state of our knowledge on your topic and important questions for future research. More information on this assignment will be provided on Canvas.

**MAKE-UP POLICY:** Students who miss a quiz, writing assignment, or annotated bibliography assignment for a reason consistent with UF's excused absence policy will receive a reasonable amount of time to make up that assignment. Documentation will be required before assignments can be made up. Any missed quizzes, writing assignments, or annotated bibliograph assignment for reasons not covered in UF's attendance policy will receive a score of 0. Assignments missed due to technical or computer problems will also receive a score of zero. However, you may drop the lowest quiz score, and the lowest writing assignment score. **No other provisions will be provided for making up work.**
