Course Description:

Medical sociology (also known as the sociology of health and illness) is a subdiscipline of sociology focused on the social causes and distribution of health and illness. We will explore numerous questions in this course. Why does your zip code matter more to your health than your genetic code? Why does the U.S. lead the way in health care spending yet fall behind many developing nations on indicators of population health such as infant mortality? Why do racialethnic minorities experience higher rates of sickness and disability? How does stress "get under the skin" to influence health? In this course, we will explore sociological viewpoints on each of these questions and more. Students will critically engage with high-quality peer-reviewed research on topics related to the social causes of health and illness.

Required Text:

There is no textbook for this class. Required readings will consist of a variety of articles and resources available on Canvas.

Instructional Methods:

This is an asynchronous online course. Students are expected to complete each module in the order they are listed and submit all assignments before posted due dates. See Canvas for additional information.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Following the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Apply medical sociology perspectives toward understanding health and illness across the U.S. population.
- 2. Apply medical sociology perspectives toward understanding the organization of health care systems and their impact on individual and population health.

- 3. Interpret and critically engage with medical sociology scholarship published in peer-reviewed journals.
- 4. Develop critical writing skills through a final course paper.

ASSIGNMENTS

Article Review (100 points):

You are required to read and write a review of 1 peer-reviewed journal article related to a topic covered in this course. This assignment is meant to develop your understanding and evaluation skills of peer-reviewed research articles published on topics relevant to medical sociology. Your review must be at least 3 pages (4-page maximum) double-spaced and adhere to other specified guidelines. Instructions on how to complete this assignment are provided on Canvas.

Multiple Choice Quizzes (70 points):

There will be a total of 7 (10 points each) multiple choice quizzes related to the lectures, videos, and reading materials covered in each module. The purpose of the multiple-choice quizzes is to evaluate your basic understanding of the concepts covered in the modules. These quizzes will be timed and must be completed in one sitting. You may not drop any quiz grades in this class.

Short Essay Quizzes (70 points):

There will be a total of 7 (10 points each) short essay quizzes related to the lectures, videos, and reading materials covered in each module. The purpose of the short essay quizzes is to determine the extent to which you can critically examine and engage with the concepts covered in the

modules. These quizzes will be timed and must be completed in one sitting. Instructions on how to properly complete these quizzes are provided on Canvas. You may not drop any short essay quiz grades in this class.

Discussions (50 points):

You are required to participate in 5 (10 points each) discussions on Canvas throughout this course. A prompt will be provided for each discussion. You must write a 300 (minimum) word response (5 points) to the prompt, then respond to at least one other classmate in 200 (minimum) words (5 points). You may not drop any discussion grades in this class.

Final Reflection (10 points):

You are required to write a 1-page (2-page maximum) double-spaced reflection on three specific takeaways you have gained from this course. You can choose to reflect on the course in many ways. What did you learn in this course that you did not know before? What, if any modules or aspects of the course changed your opinion about health and illness? How did this course change your approach to understanding health disparities? Although this assignment is not worth many points, it is still expected that students write a meaningful reflection to receive the fullest possible points.
